The impact of the Online Safety Act's Protection of Children Codes

Three months on from when measures designed to make the online world safer for children came into force as part of the Online Safety Act's Protection of Children Codes, InternetMatters.org has considered five ways that the Act has had an impact:

- 1. Many platforms are using age verification
- 2. Terms of service are getting easier to understand
- 3. Algorithms are being redesigned to reduce harms
- 4. Platforms are improving parental controls
- 5. Platforms are being held accountable

## **Instagram AI Content PG13**

Al characters (chatbots) were introduced into many apps around three years ago and there have been many reports of the failures of the safety guardrails, resulting in children being exposed to chats, advice and guidance which is entirely age-inappropriate. Instagram has introduced a new way for parents to manage their teens' access to one-on-one chats with Al characters. Users of Teen accounts should now only see content that's similar to what they would see in a PG13 movie. The new features:

- Allow parents to turn off their child's access to one-on-one chats with AI characters entirely.
- Allow parents to block specific AI characters.
- Parents will get insights into the topics their children are chatting about with AI characters.
